



Regents Go Undefeated

The powerful 1957 West High football team completed the first undefeated -untied season in the school's twenty-seven year history by whipping the stubborn East High squad 26-0 in the final game. Both teams were wallowing through mud at Breese Stevens while West avenged East's upset victory of last year.

In their first game of the season, the Regent gridders gave indications of what was to come by trimming a highly rated Marinette team, 21-20. Scorers in this close contest were Currie, Corbett, and Parker, each with six points, and Bakken with three all-important conversions.

Traveling to Racine for its conference opener, the West football team walloped Racine Horlick, 44-0. The Regents' tenacious defense limited the Rebels to a total of 75 yards and scored a safety.

In the first city series game of the year, West blasted Central, 39-6. The Regent defense continued to be stubborn, allowing the Downtowners only seven yards rushing.


The West team hit its stride as it bowled over a previously undefeated Racine Park team, 48-0. The Regents' potent defense matched their smashing offense, which gained 426 yards, by holding Park to a minus seven yards rushing.

Jim Bakken and Gary Corbett accounted for seven of West's eight touchdowns against Beloit. Bob Behrend scampered over for the final tally as West continued its victory march.

This year Homecoming was again a happy event, due to West's trampling of Janesville, 53-0. As was true in many West games this year, every Regent who suited up for the contest saw action.

All eyes were on Kenosha November 4th as two unbeaten Big 8 teams—Kenosha and West—clashed for the championship title. An undivided team effort spurred the mighty West eleven to march over a tough Kenosha outfit, 47-14.

A fitting acknowledgement of this great West team was the appointing of seven Regents to All-City honors. Five West gridders were All-Conference selections—Bakken, Lautz, Honeck, Fox, and Gordon. Bakken and Fox were chosen for the All State Team, and Bakken was selected as one of the outstanding high school football players in the United States. Coach Fred Jacoby was chosen Big 8 Coach of the Year.





Curlers Reveal Surprising Strength

The mounting enthusiasm with which curling is being accepted throughout the nation was mirrored at West High as forty boys reported for the curling team. These boys formed ten rinks, which were skipped by four seniors, three juniors, and three sophomores. Led by the Fritz Kubly, Dave Prafke, and Fred Nelson rinks, the curlers had one of the most successful seasons that West has produced.


Five bonspiels were entered by West this year. At all of these, the determination of the players stood out. Coupled with this determination, the steady improvement shown by the curlers was probably the most encouraging aspect of the season.

The team got off to a fast start as the Dave Prafke rink won the city round robin with 11 wins and one loss. Rinks from East, West and Wisconsin High competed in this tournament. In the Wausau Bonspiel, the Kubly rink beat the Prafke rink to win the second event. In a comparable situation at the Poynette Bonspiel both the Kubly and the Prafke rinks lost in the semi-finals.

Rebounding after earlier losses, the Fred Nelson rink copped the first event at the Portage Bonspiel. The competition at this bonspiel is comparable to that of a state meet. In the same meet the Kubly rink lost to Portage in the finals of the third event.

Returning home the curlers continued to improve. In the Madison Invitational Bonspiel the Prafke rink advanced to the finals before being pushed out of the first event by the Detienne Rink from Wausau. A Lodi rink also edged past the Nelson rink in the second event finals. Competing once again in inter-city play, the City Bonspiel was won by the Fred Nelson rink.

Coach Evans expressed great optimism for next season's play. There will be four rinks coming up from junior high and the six rinks returning from the senior high. With ten experienced rinks to start the season, next year's Curling team should be in for some "smooth sliding".







Big-8 Co-Champs

Fourth in State

The 1958 basketball team continued West's winning tradition by being crowned co-champions in the Big 8 and then finishing fourth in the state tournament. Coach Jim Stevens, in his first year as Regent leader, directed West to a successful season record of 24-5.

In conference play West beat every opponent at least once but was forced to share first place honors with Madison East. A high point in the Big 8 race was West's defeat of the East team. Behind by nine points at the half, West stormed back after the intermission and subdued the Purgolders, 76-67. Another exciting conference victory was the Central-West game. The Regents outlasted their stubborn city rivals in a great defensive battle by a score of 49-44.

In the Middleton sub-regional of the state tournament, West gave indications of future successes when they defeated Prairie du Sac and Middleton by scores of 57-36 and 73-53 respectively. A welcome scoring punch was provided by Bill Workman, who dumped in 41 points in these two games.

One of the highlights of the season was the West last-second victory over Reedsburg in the regional meet. Bill Workman contributed 26 points and Jim Bakken, who connected for 22 points, fired a jump shot from the free throw circle with two seconds remaining and clinched the victory for West, 69-67.

The Regents were swept into the state tournament in Madison after defeating Randolph and Ripon in the sectional meet with comparative ease.

West High's victorious season was climaxed by a thrilling, one point win over Manitowoc in the field house. West was gallant in their two point defeat at the hands of state champions, Madison East, and in the loss to last year's state champions, Shawano, 77 to 72.

The ten men who made up the tournament squad that captured fourth in the state were Jim Bakken, Bill Workman, Fritz Kruger, Tom Doran, Roger Wiebe, Howie Mazur, Fred Heivilin, Tim Harrington, Paul Hathaway, and Jim Grieger.

Improved Wrestlers



The grapplers got off to a good start on December 6th by whipping Beloit in their first dual match, 24-16. They followed it up with a 21-18 victory over Janesville—the first victory West has ever had against them in a dual match. The West matmen were then defeated, 26-14, by a strong Monona-Grove team, but they bounced back three days later to whip Racine Horlick, 34-8. In the remaining matches West defeated Central, 29-9, lost at East, 24-18, beat Wisconsin High, 27-11, and then lost the last two matches to East and Lake Mills, 24-14 and 17-15.

Coach Hable was very pleased with West's vastly improved wrestling team as they had a very successful season with five wins and four losses—much improved over last year's 2-7 record.

In the city tournament West finished second be-

hind East. The Regents had nine wrestlers in the finals, but only one, John Walsh, won a championship. In the Big 8 meet held at Beloit, West could do no better than fourth. Steve Martin and Dave Neal both were second in their weight divisions. The sectionals for the state meet were held for two days at Reedsburg, and West came through as five boys qualified for the state. They were Fred Milverstedt, 103; Steve Martin, 120; John Walsh, 128; John McLeod, 155; and Dave Neal at 165. In the state meet Steve Martin placed second and was the only one to score points for West; however, John Walsh, John McLeod, and Dave Neal each won their first bouts.

West opened its season by defeating East twice and Central once. The Regents' first loss came at the hands of Wausau. West retaliated by cutting down



The West High baseball team for 1958 gave indications of a promising year when it defeated Beloit's nine, 8-4 in the opening game of the season. Jim Bakken allowed seven hits as he struck out seven and walked one. Veteran catcher Jim Fowler knocked in three runs on three hits. Sophomore John Rast, representing West for the first time as a shortstop, connected for two hits and batted in two runs.

In a non-conference game, West tripped Edgerton 8-6, but the following weekend the Regents lost to Kenosha, 5-0, on a four hitter by the Kenosha pitcher. The West nine then won two straight games; the

first against Stoughton, 15-5, and the second over Beloit, 7-3. The first city series game, which was with East, found West on the short end of an 8-1 score. The Regents collected only two hits.




